Citizens Speak Up! Public Hearing on Oil & Gas Drilling Plan

On November 13. New Jersey residents and visitors will have the only opportunity in the state to provide verbal comments to the US Department of the Interior's Minerals Management Service (MMS) on the proposed five-year oil and gas leasing program (http://www.mms.gov/5-year/2007-2012main.htm). The proposed program includes provisions to drill for oil and gas off the coast of Virginia, less than 100 miles from NJ's coast.

Organizations and citizens are urged to attend this public hearing and rally your voices in opposition to this ocean drilling plan that threatens our environment, economy, and quality of life. The hearing will be held on Monday, **November 13, 2006**, in Atlantic City at the Sheraton Atlantic City Convention Center Hotel. The public's comments will be accepted at two sessions: 2-5PM and 6-9PM. To submit written comments by **November 24, 2006** (via mail or electronically), go to the above referenced website.

Officials Fend Off Oil & Gas Drilling--For Now

Thanks to the nearly unanimous opposition from NJ's US Representatives and to the strong leadership shown by US Senator Robert Menendez (D-NJ), the threat of abandoning the moratorium on drilling off the Atlantic coast has been averted, for now. Despite backroom efforts, leaders were unable to

compromise on a far-reaching House bill on offshore oil and gas drilling with a less expansive Senate version. The entire Congressional delegation in NJ, with exception Rep. Scott Garrett (R-5), opposed both versions and any weakening of the moratorium.

In addition, US Senators Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ) and Robert Menendez (D-NJ) showed leadership in their opposition to the bill by threatening to filibuster any compromise that included provisions from the imposing House version.

Call your elected officials to thank them for their support and to tell them to keep NJ's guard up, as the threat of oil and gas drilling is expected to return following the election during the lame duck session and in the new year.

New Jersey to Develop an Energy Master Plan

New Jersey Governor Jon Corzine recently announced the beginning of a year-long, multi-agency process to develop an energy master plan for the state. This plan would create a long-term energy vision to deal with the state's energy needs through 2020. A series of public meetings to introduce the planning process were held in mid-October throughout the state.

There are several upcoming opportunities for public comment and participation throughout the process, including an opportunity to comment on the draft Goals and Objectives (due **November 3**), and suggestions on strategies and actions for specific objectives (due November 15). Working to Manage Sediments in NY/NJ Harbor

Since February, COA has been participating in a **Regional Sediments Management Workgroup** for the New York/New Jersey Harbor to develop a set of recommendations to manage and improve sediments in the harbor. The goals established by the workgroup are as follows: "The sediments of the NY/NJ Harbor will support and sustain both a healthy ecosystem and a robust regional economy and sediments will be managed as a resource to achieve this goal." To that end, the workgroup has tackled issues such as sediment quality, sediment quantity, and dredging with an emphasis on addressing them from a regional perspective.

Participants in the workgroup include the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), US Army Corps of Engineers, Port Authority of NY/NJ, NJ Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP), NJ Department of Transportation (NJDOT), NY Department of Environmental Conservation (NYDEC), New York City Economic Development Corporation (NYCEDC), Monmouth University, and NY/NJ Baykeeper. The workgroup has made significant progress and expects to have recommendations completed by early next year. The document will be reviewed by the Policy Committee of the NY/NJ Harbor Estuary Program (HEP). This committee is ultimately responsible for the approval of HEP's goals and objectives, and establishes priorities and direction for the development and implementation of the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP). The committee also approves resource and funding allocations for the Program.

Offshore LNG Island Moving Forward

Atlantic Sea Island Group LLC is moving forward in their attempt to construct a Liquid Natural Gas Facility in the Atlantic Ocean off Long Island and Sandy Hook. The company submitted an application to the US Coast Guard under the Deep Water Ports Act.

The project calls for the construction of a 100+ acre island to be built between the shipping lanes, very near or on Cholera Banks. Despite its name, Cholera Banks is a premier fishing ground. The source and quality of the hundreds of millions of tons of material needed to build such a massive island is not clear. The application process is in the early stages and is currently being reviewed for completeness by several relevant federal agencies, including the National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The application is not currently open for public comment.

COASTAL WATER QUALITY

Bacteria Plaques Branchport Creek

Clean Ocean Action continues to follow the problem of fecal contamination of Branchport Creek from the Monmouth Park Racetrack. For the past *three years*, fecal coliform concentrations in the water on the grounds of and around the racetrack were unacceptably high. This summer these concentrations of bacteria consistently reached into the millions (the state limit is 104 colonies/100 mls water).

Since that time, the racetrack hired an environmental consultant who looked in the underground pipe system designed to carry stormwater runoff from the track to the local sewage treatment plant and immediately noticed it was completely clogged with sediment and horse manure, causing the bacteria-loaded water to be diverted to the creek.

In late August, the lines were cleared and a partially opened valve was properly closed-off. Both of these problems were contributing to the pollution of the creek. It is not clear why it took three years for these relatively simple procedures to occur. Although these actions did improve water quality, the numbers still show a problem. Follow-up samples taken by the Monmouth County Health Department indicated concentrations as high as 17,000 colonies/100 mls, still well-above state standards.

Also in August, COA was told that after the horses leave, a camera would be used to inspect all the sewer lines to assess their condition and identify any problems. However, in a recent conversation with NJDEP officials, it is not clear what, if any, additional actions will be taken by racetrack managers to further eliminate the sources of contamination.

COA urges NJDEP to require the racetrack to fully investigate all possible sources of contamination and eliminate them prior to the next racing season, so the citizens of
