Last month, Clean Ocean Action launched a "Call for Ocean Emotion." The campaign asked for citizens to make Valentines to welcome Governor Christie and to encourage him to act quickly on his strong commitment to the ocean.

Groups, businesses, students from pre-school to college, and citizens responded with gusto sending in thousands of colorful hand-made Valentinesmany of them works of art. In just two weeks, the collection of Valentines poured-in from all over the state of New Jersey.

"We know these are tough economic times and Governor Christie is facing serious



challenges. We want to send an early wave of support, encouragement and thanks to the Governor for commitments he made toward a clean and healthy ocean. The Governor clearly recognizes that coastal tourism is the back bone of the state's economy with hundreds of thousands of jobs," said COA's Executive Director Cindy Zipf. Many school students and children made valentines and created awareness of ocean issues to their peers, including proposed liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminals for importing foreign natural gas.

decision about something very important to me - the ocean - and the need to keep it free of LNG projects," said Elizabeth Stockton a Manasquan High School sophomore.

COA volunteer Fran Donnelly worked tirelessly to get the schools of her community in Hazlet to participate. Fran's grandson, Peter Donnelly, a fifth grader at Beers Street School in Hazlet said, "I hope Governor Christie listens to the people of New Jersey and vetoes LNG projects. LNG is not safe and is not needed. President Theodore Roosevelt once said, 'We are not building this country for a day, but to last through the ages."

NJ Voters Overwhelmingly Support Environmental Protections, But Does Trenton?

According to a recent Monmouth University/Gannett NJ Poll, NJ voters would strongly oppose any weakening of environmental regulations by Governor Chris Christie. Among registered voters, 42% would be very upset if environmental regulations are relaxed, 37% would be somewhat upset, 15% would be not too upset, and just 4% would be not at all upset. With 79% of voters clearly in favor of protecting the environment and only 4% having no interest in upholding standards, this is perhaps one of the clearest mandates to our elected officials in Trenton.

Unfortunately, many officials still haven't received the message. Legislators in Trenton are trying again to weaken environmental regulations by allowing developers to continue ignoring NJ's Water Quality Management Planning Rules. Bills A2070 and S1337 from Assemblyman Jerry Green and Senator Paul Sarlo, respectively, would undermine the Department of Environmental Protection's authority to prohibit the extension of sewer lines, with resulting sprawl, into environmentally sensitive areas, wetlands and rare species habitats. Governor Corzine vetoed a similar bill before leaving office and COA urges Governor Christie to do the same. COA demands more leadership in the legislature, following the lead of those who voted "No" last session, including Senator Buono and Assembly members Gove, Holzapfel, Rumpf, and McKeon.

COA is concerned with recent Executive Orders from Governor Christie that could undermine environmental protections. Executive Order 2 in particular sets standards that could favor industry and weaken current standards. COA is watching closely to make sure the Executive Orders do not lead to the undermining of our environmental protections.

Smoke Free Beaches

On February 18, COA's Executive Director Cindy Zipf testified before the NJ Senate's Health Committee in favor of three bills that would limit cigarette smoking in certain settings. The bills were from Senators Barbara Buono and Loretta Weinberg (S669), Andrew Ciesla (S889), and Shirley Turner (S443).

Cigarette butts are the first or second most common piece of litter picked up by COA volunteers during our Beach Sweeps. In 2009, volunteers collected 30,784 cigarette butts during the bi-annual Sweeps. Cigarette butts can contain chemicals including lead, benzene and arsenic which are harmful to the environment and are often ingested by wildlife mistaking them for food. Cigarette butts persist as a pollutant in the marine environment, breaking into smaller pieces that can bio-accumulate in the seafood we eat. They also contain plastic elements that do not biodegrade.

Banning smoking on public beaches is an important first step in reducing this source of pollution. We must also work to reduce upland sources of pollution through enforcement of litter laws, as many pieces of pollution start inland, wash down storm drains to rivers and oceans and then back to our beaches. COA applauds these leaders in their efforts to "go green" to save our big blue.

Spring into Action for Clean Water!

Just when you think this stormy winter will never end, spring emerges along with the quest for a green lawn, which often results in the improper use of fertilizer. Current fertilizer application rates are overwhelming and far exceed the amounts absorbed by plants and lawns. Excessive nutrients find their way to the nearest water body and have the potential to destroy its fragile ecosystem. The following tips can help you maintain a healthy and "ecofriendly" yard:

- Reduce the size of your lawn by adding ground cover and gardens. Lawns are high maintenance, expensive and add to runoff problems.
- Use native plants to increase water filtering and create a wildlife habitat.
- Don't fertilize your lawn or garden until you test the soil. Soil-testing kits are available at garden centers.
- If needed, use slow release, water insoluble and/or organic fertilizers. For a list of these see www.nitrogenfree.com.
- Aerate your soil and remove dead organics by raking.
- Install rain barrels at your downspouts to reuse rain water and prevent runoff.
- Mow high and often. Leave clippings to fertilize naturally.



Army Dismisses Public's Call for Environmental Impact Statement at Fort Monmouth

The Army has determined that the closure of Fort Monmouth, planned for September 2011, will have "no significant adverse effects on the quality of the human or natural environment." The decision was based on an Environmental Assessment (EA) of Fort Monmouth released last spring and public comments on the EA. Several environmental investigations were not completed or even included in the EA. COA and others found the EA to be inadequate and concluded that further investigation in the form of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) was needed. The towns surrounding Fort Monmouth also called for an EIS. However, since the Army determined no significant impacts will occur, an EIS will not be done.

In addition, although further investigations are on-going or intended, the Army said that they could not wait for their completion. Despite the many public comments criticizing the EA, the Army still maintained that the EA was sufficient.
