## 25th Annual Beach Sweeps



## **VOLUNTEERS "SPRING" INTO ACTION FOR THE 25TH ANNUAL SPRING BEACH SWEEPS**

An estimated 5,000 volunteers hit the beaches to participate in Clean Ocean Action's (COA) 25th Annual Spring Beach Sweeps at a record 69 sites throughout New Jersey on Saturday, April 24th. Volunteers removed and catalogued thousands of pieces of debris to document ongoing pollution issues.

"The Beach Sweeps program is much more than collecting people's trash, rather it is an educational tool that strives to raise awareness about the severity of the local pollution problem," stated Tavia Danch, COA's Pollution Prevention Coordinator. "Volunteers participating in the Sweeps complete data cards, which are reviewed, compiled, and analyzed by Clean Ocean Action," added Danch.

The data collected from the Spring Beach Sweeps will be combined with data from this year's Fall Beach Sweeps, and then analyzed and presented in an annual report. These annual reports identify pollution problems, educate citizens on the types and quantities of debris, aid legislators in passing and enforcing laws to protect the

marine environment, and contribute to local and international efforts to combat marine pollution.

"The beaches were trashed this winter and spring by storms, and friends of the ocean stepped up to their aid, as they have for 25 years, said COA Executive Director Cindy Zipf. "The power of citizens is extraordinary," she added.

US Representative Frank Pallone (D-6), NJ State Senator Sean Kean (R-11), and Monmouth County Freeholder Amy Mallet and Freeholder and Comcast Vice President Rob Clifton attended the Spring 2010 Beach Sweeps rally at Sandy Hook and supported the volunteers' efforts. Congressman Pallone

later joined 100 volunteers at Pier Village in Long Branch to help clean up the site.

Senator James Whelan encouraged the 350-400 Atlantic City volunteers who came to clean the southern NJ shores. Girl Scout Troop #1351 from Wall, NJ and eighty other volunteers came to clean up the 16th Avenue Beach in Belmar and at 1st Avenue Beach in Belmar a young Beach Sweeper found a bikini. Monmouth Beach volunteers found a boat gasoline tank while Sea Bright volunteers found everything including a kitchen sink and a truck tire.

17,166 bottle caps were collected from Sandy Hook alone where 1300 volunteers came to participate. Among the thousands of other items collected at Sandy Hook volunteers also found 94 different shoes.

Tires were found in Keansburg along with a bed sheet, and underwear. Union Beach volunteers found a sled. Ideal Beach in Middletown drew in about 40-50 people and large amounts of foam were found there and at the Popamore Point site in Highlands. Two man and woman human shaped candles bound with tape were found at Port Monmouth Bayshore Waterfront Park. All these and more data results will be available when the 2010 annual report is completed at the end of the year.
